PATRONAGE CAPITAL & ANNUAL MEETING

You own our cooperative, which has the sole purpose of delivering safe, reliable, and renewable power to you at the lowest cost. All revenue exceeding the cost to provide electric service is

allocated back to you in the form of patronage capital.

Adams-Columbia Electric Cooperative's board of directors approved the 2017 patronage capital general retirement at the October board meeting and therefore, ACEC will be returning more than \$1.9 million of patronage capital to members and former members of the organization this year. In determining the members' general retirement, the board reviews all pertinent financial impacts and policies and conducts a comprehensive discussion before reaching their decision.

To equitably return patronage capital, ACEC will pay 100 percent of past capital earned in the years of 1994 and 1995, as well as a portion of years 1996 through 2006.

Many of our current members will be given a credit on their electric bill rather than a printed check payment. Current members eligible for a refund will see their patronage capital refund on the bill they receive in November.

ACEC members with more than one account will see their patronage capital applied to their primary electric account. Checks will be issued for refunds \$150 or larger. Checks will also be issued and sent to former members who no longer have an electric account with ACEC, and have at least \$10 in patronage capital scheduled to be refunded.

Annual Meeting

We are pleased to announce that Adams-Columbia Electric Cooperative's 2018 annual meeting will be held in May. Much more information will be forthcoming, but here's an overview on the director nomination process.

Adams-Columbia's bylaws outline the details by which director candidates are nominated by petition. To be valid, a petition shall be signed by not less than 25 members and shall be delivered to the cooperative by a pre-determined date.

Adams-Columbia members living in Districts One or Six will see their incumbent director's three-year term expire at the 2018 annual meeting. In addition, one of the two At Large director terms will expire in 2018. For our

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cooperative, this will be the first election with electronic balloting as an option. Members will be able to vote in person at the annual meeting, by absentee ballot, or through the electronic balloting process.

In the coming months,

you will receive more information about the process by which members can make recommendations on advisory resolutions to be brought before the membership at the annual meeting. If the membership approves an advisory resolution, then it would go before the full board for their consideration. Recommendations can be submitted anytime of the year; a deadline for recommendations to be considered at the 2018 annual meeting will be announced in January. A deadline is needed to ensure the Rules Committee has adequate time to review and research all recommendations to present complete and accurate information at the annual meeting.
