With the end of summer comes the start of another school year. Once again, the roadsides are dotted with clusters of children waiting for their school bus. As they head back to school, children may have more on their minds than their own safety.

With seven children of my own, I can attest to how distracted they can be. It is therefore incumbent upon all of us to please be extra careful when driving.

Be sure to stop for a school bus with flashing red lights. You never know when a child will dart out in front of your car. Also, remember that failure to stop at least 20 feet from the bus and remain stopped until the red lights are turned off or the bus resumes motion can bring a fine of \$30 to \$300. Drive slowly with your eyes on the road. Most school zones post speed limits of 15 miles per hour.

54th WECA Youth Leadership Congress is a big hit with students

Understanding the cooperative difference and identifying traits of leaders are just two of the topics that highlighted the 54th WECA Youth Leadership Congress (YLC). Adams-Columbia Electric Cooperative (ACEC) sponsored 11 high school students to the 2017 YLC held July 26–28 at the University of Wisconsin-River Falls. This annual event is coordinated by was the Wisconsin Electric Cooperation Association on behalf of the state's rural electric cooperatives.

Students from around the state participated in the three-day program. Through a mix of workshop sessions, hands-on activities, and team-building experiences, participants were exposed to a variety of real-life issues. They were given opportunities to identify

and explore their leadership potential. Dynamic professional speakers, teen peers, and cooperative employees provided participants with information and tools to deal with the weighty issues high school students face every day. The program also included social and recreational time to introduce the students to college life.

Motivational speaker Craig Hillier returned to the Youth Leadership Congress. The staff of UW-River Falls challenged delegates to complete several mental and physical activities



using teamwork and cooperation as essential ingredients for a successful outcome. New to the program was hypnotist Dr. Al Snyder from Mondovi. His highly entertaining program was a favorite topic of discussion for the remainder of the conference.

Professor Dr. David Trechter from the UW-River Falls College of Agriculture talked about the cooperative business model and the impact cooperatives have on our everyday lives. At the banquet, YLC delegates learned the fine points of formal dinner etiquette from UW-River Falls Professor Melissa Wilson.

Delegates leave the three-day conference with valuable leadership skills they can use both in school and in their community activities. Each delegate is

encouraged to reflect on his or her experiences and then participate in an annual essay contest. Educational scholarships are awarded to top entrants.

Students interested in attending the 2018 Youth Leadership Congress can learn more through their school or directly from ACEC's newsletters and website. To be eligible, students must be in their sophomore or junior year of high school. They must also be from an ACEC member family. The tentative dates for next year's program are July 25–27, 2018.


