BOARD APPROVES 2018 BUDGET

At the November board meeting, Adams-Columbia Electric Cooperative staff presented the board of directors with the proposed work plan and budget for 2018. After a lengthy question and answer session the board approved the proposed 2018 budget with two minor amendments.

As our wholesale power costs from our supplier, Alliant Energy, are increasing, we are

working hard to reduce operating expenses and capital projects—like poles and wire. These efforts, along with reducing patronage capital retirements, allow us to lessen the pressure of increased rates.

Though it may not be possible to avoid rate increases altogether, these efforts to control costs and maintain equity may minimize rate increases. The

co-op's investment in the West Riverside Energy Center Project is another measure we are taking to attempt to stabilize rates and minimize increases in the future.

Adams-Columbia's Rules and Regulations along with rates will be reviewed in the coming months by staff. The recommended changes will be presented to the board of directors and will be considered for approval at upcoming board meetings. Look to future publications for any chang-

es that may occur to our Rules and Regulations or rates.

Last month, I announced our 2018 annual meeting will be held at the Portage High School Auditorium on the evening of Tuesday, May 15, 2018. As you may recall, last year the board size was reduced from 11 members to nine. The district map was redrawn to have seven districts, with two At-Large board positions, and no more than two directors allowed from any one district. This year there are three seats up for election: District 1, District 6, and an At-Large seat.

The next few pages contain information on how you can participate in the governance of your cooperative, with information on the director candidate nomination process and how to submit an advisory resolution to the Rules Committee.

The application for our educational scholarship is now available on our website. Scholarships are awarded in all fields of post-secondary education. The scholarship program is funded entirely by unclaimed patronage capital and adds no cost to your electric bill. Additional details can be found on page 16.

his year marks Adams-Columbia Electric Cooperative's 31st Annual Educational Scholarship program. Throughout the years hundreds of students who are members of Adams-Columbia have been awarded scholarships. These scholarships range in denominations of \$250 to \$1,000.

Scholarships are awarded in all fields of postsecondary education from vocational to graduate studies. According to program guidelines, scholarships are available to adults and dependent children of all ACEC member families; non-guardian grandchildren of ACEC members are not eligible. Scholarships will be awarded on the basis of need and excellence in academics, social and community-service activities.

This program adds no cost to your electric bill. It is funded entirely from unclaimed patronage capital.

Adams-Columbia members (of all ages) who are enrolled in adult educational programs are encouraged to complete an application and submit it by the deadline date. The application forms and other scholarship information can be found exclusively on Adams-Columbia's website at www.acecwi.com.

The deadline for returning completed applications is Friday, February 9, 2018. Please be prompt in completing and returning your scholarship application. Scholarship applications will not be accepted after the deadline date.

Three director seats up for election this year

In 2018, District 1 and 6 residents are eligible to run for board seats in their respective districts. Residents in all districts, except District 2, (where two continuing directors reside) are eligible to run for the At Large director position.

Are you interested in running for a board seat?

Qualifications

Director qualifications are cited in the cooperative's Bylaws:

- To be a full-time resident and member in good standing in the director district from which he or she has been nominated.
- Cannot be employed by or financially interested in a competing enterprise or business selling energy or supplies to the cooperative.
- · Cannot have been in default on any obligations to the cooperative in the preceding 12 months.
- Cannot have been employed in any capacity by the cooperative within five years of the date of election.
- Cannot be an incumbent of, or candidate for, an elective county, state, or federal office filled by election on a party ticket.
- To have not been convicted of any felony or of any other offense involving a breach of trust.

How to run

Adams-Columbia's Bylaws outline the procedure by which director candidates are nominated. The Bylaws state that the nomination of candidates for director shall be by petition. To be valid, a petition shall be signed by not less than 25 members and shall be delivered to the cooperative's Friendship office by Wednesday, February 14, 2018.

What is an advisory resolution?

By submitting an advisory resolution, you are bringing forth your recommendation on a cooperative matter to be reviewed by the Rules Committee.

What is the rules committee?


The Rules Committee is comprised of members of the Advisory Committee and ACEC directors. The Rules Committee is tasked with establishing the rules for governing the annual meeting, and reviewing advisory resolutions submitted by members.

What is the advisory resolution process?

Recommendations are reviewed by the Rules Committee; if accepted, you can bring forth your advisory resolution to the membership at the annual meeting. If the membership approves the resolution it is then brought to the board of directors as an advisory resolution.

Who can submit an advisory resolution?

Any member can submit an advisory resolution. The deadline to submit an advisory resolution to be considered for the 2018 Annual Meeting is February 14, 2018.


