



SAFETY COMES FIRST AT ADAMS-COLUMBIA

This month I would like to talk to you about something that has always been paramount in the co-op world: safety. Adams-Columbia is, and has always been, very involved in safety and safety education. We work closely with Federated Rural Electric Insurance Exchange on ways to reduce electricity-related accidents for both our employees and the public.

The best way to prevent these accidents is through education. I, with the full support of our board of directors, am proud to say that Adams-Columbia has an in-house education program that teaches the importance of electrical safety to all ages. Our youth safety program is presented at

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schools throughout our service territory. Teachers can contact ACEC to come to their school for a hotline demonstration to partner with their curriculum. ACEC staff presents both an in-

class educational program and a demonstration with live electricity.

The hotline demonstration is run by a lineman and teaches that our bodies are conductors of electricity. The lineman shows what happens to various items when they come into contact with a live wire. Kite strings, branches, and even a hotdog give the children perspective as to the damage that electricity can cause, and the respect it commands.

Not only are children taught about the importance of safe electricity, we also present to community organizations like police departments, fire departments, and emergency medical personnel. It is important for first responders to have training on what to do if they come across downed powerlines—for example, if responding to a car accident with downed lines over the vehicle.

ACEC also holds a regular course at the Operating Engineers Training Center in Coloma. Apprentices learn not only how to avoid digging into powerlines, but also what to do if they come in contact with an underground or overhead line.

Unfortunately, we still receive information from our insurer, Federated, monthly that recounts injuries and the loss of human life. Please remember to use Diggers Hotline—dial 811 before you dig—and to call emergency personnel if you come across a downed powerline.
